#### **About the Training Programme**

The INIA Satellite Centre for sub-Saharan Africa is introducing its first training programme in Legislations, Ageing Policy Framework and Older Persons' Inclusion in Development Agendas. As a matter of deliberate strategy, the programme is designed to last for 5 days and is expected to attract participants from Human Rights Commissions as well as human rights Institutes, Legal Aid Council, members of the ECOWAS Parliament and Civil Society Organizations.

The training programme is designed to influence and mobilize support for effective integration of ageing and older persons in legislative discourses and for increased consideration of appropriate normative contents for legislation on ageing in ECOWAS Parliament. The five-day workshop, aims to build on the gains of the African Regional High Level Conference on the Human Rights and Situation of Older Persons in Africa organized, November 25-26, 2019, in collaboration with the government of Nigeria, National Human Rights Commission of Nigeria, ECOWAS Parliament and the Stakeholder Group on Ageing Africa (SGA Africa), with the support of UN OHCHR and UNDESA. This was proposed earlier but was scuttled by COVID-19

INIA Satellite Centre mandate is to fulfil the human resource training needs in all aspects of ageing in sub-Saharan Africa; to enhance the national and regional systems' capacity to deliver quality transformative policies, planning and implementation as well as monitoring and evaluation of corresponding programs and services to the 74.4 million older persons and the rapidly increasing population advancing into old age in Africa.

### Objective

The objective of the programme is to promote partnership and cooperation between the Satellite Centre and relevant agencies and institutions of government in the sub-Saharan region. Being the pilot programme, this first edition of the training is targeted to attract participants from National Human Rights Institute and its principal organ the National Human Rights Commission.

The Training is aimed at strengthening their capacity to promote and advocate for legislation and legal reforms that will compel state actors to establish sustainable mechanism for social inclusion of older persons in development agendas.

Participants will be guided to debate on how to shift the paradigm; how to change the way governments, regional & sub-regional organizations, institutions and public administrations perceive ageing, plan to deliver effective, inclusive and accountable systems; to inform policy reviews and revisions, based on research, data collection and analyses and in line with regional and international ageing-specific frameworks, using various bottom-up methodologies conducive to the participation of older persons.

#### **Expected Outcomes**

At the end of the training, participants should

Have knowledge of Global ageing, Africa's demographic profile and its implications and seize opportunity for learning and exchanges across the countries of the sub-regions

- Understand Ageism, Systemic drivers of older persons' vulnerability and the human rights situation of older persons
- Understand substantive areas of ageing; ageing and health –social determinants of health and wellbeing; Basic geriatric care and, long term and palliative care options in Africa, poverty and social protection systems; human rights situation of older persons, elder abuse, ageing, gender and culture; ageing and economic growth opportunities, age friendly communities and acquire the skills for ageing policy crafting, review, revision and contents for normative frameworks and effective policy actions
- Fast track progress towards resolution/declaration and/or an action plan which includes ageing and older persons; support for Protocol to the AU Charter on Human and People's Rights and the Rights of Older Persons and the UN Convention on the Rights of Older Persons
- Improve quality of advocacy and stakeholder's engagement
- Address knowledge gaps and help Identify innovative opportunities in the African Region to further support the inclusion of older persons in development agendas.

Course Title: International Training Programme in Legislations, Ageing Policy Framework and Older Persons' Inclusion in Development Agendas

#### **General Course Synopsis:**

The training modules are designed and taught with practical implications, towards raising awareness of older people's rights, challenging ageism, enhancing understanding of elements for comprehensive policy development, analyses and planning. It is to interrogate multi-sectoral polices, the existing national data system's capacities including National aggregate data reporting, in the context of older persons' inclusion, in order to precipitate integrated systemic response. It is also critical to framing transformative public conversions and actions.

Participants will review evidence and data of their respective countries' multi-indicator surveys, National Living standard surveys, evidence collected by U.S. Census Bureau Population Division, aspects of the African Union Policy Framework and Plan of Action on Ageing 2002 under review, the Protocol to the African Charter on Human and People's Rights on the Rights of Older Persons; the AU Agenda 2063 and Agenda 2030 and aspects of the "Third review and appraisal of the Madrid International Plan of Action on Ageing, 2002." (ECOSOC resolution 2018/6 of 17 April 2018)

## **Target Participants:**

The training workshop will target policy and decision makers engaged in multi-sector policy making, legislation, planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation, including Government officials, ECOWAS Parliamentarian, dealing with poverty, gender, disability and ageing development issues, as well as civil society organizations and academia in the region. It is majorly aimed at developing skills set for policies, legislations formulations and program planning and implementations. The training component is emphasized (rather than dialogue)
